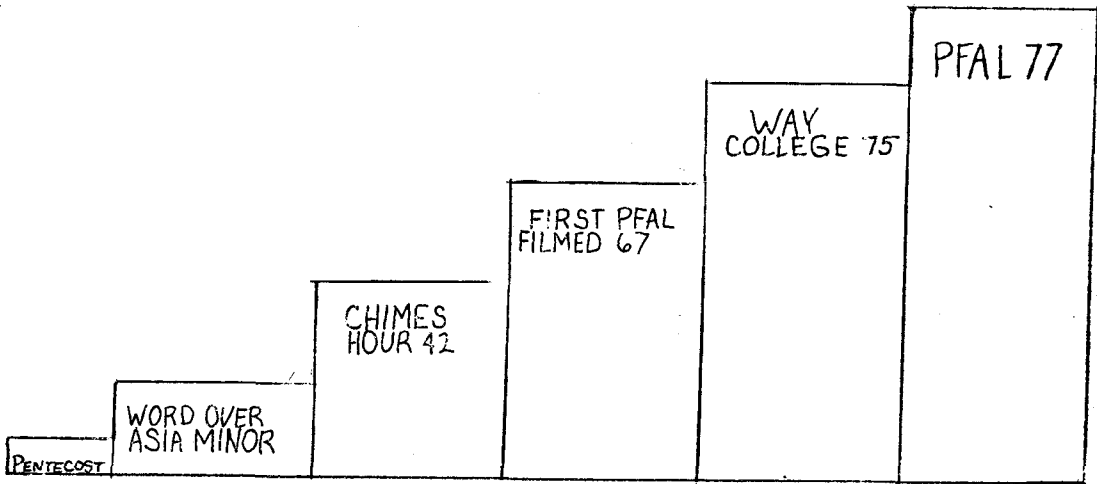

"Our Twig had a good learning time while ushering last week.

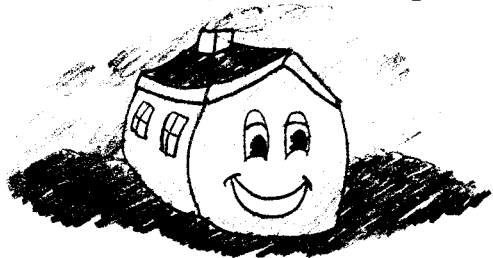
We learned           to smile

Until the procedure of Twig seating begins, several things would facilitate the seating both at Kenyon and the Chapel if they were made known to the student body:
