

The Way Corps is not looking for just anyone. Whether or not we're for you is the decision you must make carefully.


We are "tough" and only the "tough" make it. The Corps is for champions. If you've got it (heart and head), we've got it for you.


If you are qualified to "run with the winners" and be a "somebody" far beyond "God's nursery school," The Way Corps is for you. You decide.




A UNIQUE EDUCATIONAL ADVENTURE

The Way Corps is a leadership training program developed by The Way International, America's foremost Biblical research and teaching ministry. The Way Corps is a unique educational venture. The educational principles involved in The Way Corps are not new or untested. The Way Corps' roots originate in the training centers of Old Testament times when great men of vision and influence, such as Abraham, Samuel, Elijah, Elisha and, most obviously Jesus Christ, lived with their students. 
Those things, which ye have both learned, and received, and heard, and seen in me, do: and the God of peace shall be with you.









IT IS WRITTEN


Drawing upon Biblical principles of learning and living, The Way Corps is designed in its various phases of lecture, study, examination, physical labor and on-the-field practicum, to teach students how to apply God's Word in all aspects of life. The heart of The Way Corps is expressed in its motto: "It is written." These words, spoken by Jesus Christ, express the sole purpose of the training program: To prepare leaders for effective character-building service in any community, state or nation in the world.

PREPARATION FOR SERVICE

The Way Corps is four years of preparation for a lifetime of Christian living and service. Preparation begins with an apprentice year, spent under the supervision of a Way Corps leader in a local area or at one of the training centers of The Way International. The four teaching centers are The Way International Headquarters in New Knoxville, Ohio: The Way College of Biblical Research, Indiana Campus in Rome City, Indiana; The Way College of Emporia in Emporia, Kansas; and Camp Gunnison-The Way Family Ranch in Gunnison, Colorado. The second year is spent in residence in the heart of the work/study program. The third year is an interim year of practical

application of the principles on the field. The final year, spent in residence at the various teaching centers, concludes with graduation. Graduates of The Way Corps serve in various capacities in areas of concern, interest and need throughout the world.







THE WAY FAMILY CORPS

Situated on the beautiful 200-acre Indiana Campus, The Way College of Biblical Research is the year-round home of The Way Family Corps, especially designed for entire families or single parents with children. The Family Corps has a flavor all its own. Rooted and grounded in the accuracy and integrity of God's Word, the Family Corps program at the Indiana Campus is instilling the reality of the family of God and the household of God in God's people.




BIBLICAL RESEARCH

Nearly 40 years of Biblical research have gone into developing the Power for Abundant Living series which is foundational for Way Corps training. Keys for victorious living from the Foundational Series of classes are expounded upon and used in all areas of teaching in The Way Corps. In addition to the Foundational, Intermediate and Advanced classes on Power for Abundant Living, also offered are: Witnessing and Undershepherding, Christian Family and Sex. Dealing with the Adversary, Renewed Mind. Advanced Biblical Principles. and others. Another area of study is leadership which includes courses such as Leadership Principles of Jesus Christ. Practical Management, Leader's Spouse, Christian Counseling. The Way Tree and Ministry Leadership Seminar. History is

also emphasized in courses such as Old Testament History, New Testament History, Early Church History, Christianity in America, One God and Modern Church Development, Students focus in on the New Testament as an area of study with courses which include Survey of the Gospels, Acts, Romans, Ephesians, Thessalonians and Timothy. The study of philology offers exposure in the area of languages via courses in Estrangelo Aramaic, Hebrew. New Testament Greek and Figures of Speech in the Bible. which also includes Orientalisms in the Bible.

Biblical research is the specialty of The Way Corps academic curriculum with emphasis upon Keys to Research, Advanced Keys to Research, Research Design and Writing and the Research Seminar. The culmination, the highest point of the Biblical studies curriculum, is the research project, submitted by the student in the final year in residence. The re-searching of


minute details of God's Word requires discipline. The disciplined training received in The Way Corps has prepared each student for such work. The research project builds in the student confidence in himself as a workman of the Word. A glimpse of light may satisfy some seekers of the Word of God, but those in The Way Corps desire to gaze into the full brilliance of God's light.




LEARNING FOR LIFE

Outside the academic classroom students of The Way Corps receive on-the-job training each day by serving in some phase of The Way International ministry. 





FITNESS FOR LIVING









GIVING AND RECEIVING

ADVANCED TRAINING

It is an advanced training program for specially selected men and women, many of whom will have completed a baccalaureate or postgraduate program. Upon graduation, Way Corps members receive a certificate of completion. Those holding a baccalaureate degree are awarded a Bachelor of Theology degree by The Way College of Biblical Research, Indiana Campus. All other Corps graduates receive an Associate of Theology degree from the Indiana Campus. Graduates of The Way Corps go forth as leaders and workers in areas of concern, interest and need.

PROFILES FROM THE WAY CORPS



John Hendricks

John Hendricks grew up in South Carolina. When John was 12 years old, his father left home, leaving John to help his mother raise the family. After graduating from high school, John managed a supermarket and was co-owner of a small construction company. John entered The Way Corps in 1973. After graduating from the Corps in 1976, he became the state leader of South Carolina and started a multi-faceted corporation involving landscaping, maintenance,

equipment sales and a retail store and nursery. Within two years he had one of the largest landscaping and maintenance services in South Carolina.

"The Way Corps is not a training for businessmen, it is training for Christian service that enables you to do anything successfully in life. In my work as an ordained clergyman and also running my own business, I had to push hard, delegate responsibility, pay close attention to detail, follow through and make numerous split-second decisions. Those decisions had to be right every time. These things are what made me a success so fast. I would never have accomplished what I have accomplished in the time it took me to do it if it had not been for The Way Corps training."



Bruce Mahone

Born in Chicago, Bruce later moved to Larchmont, New York with his parents. He received his bachelor of science degree in mechanical engineering from the University of Bridgeport in Connecticut. Following college, he entered The Way Corps in 1976.

After graduating from The Way Corps in 1979, Bruce began working toward his M.A./Ph.D. in the study of Biblical languages and literature at the University of Chicago Oriental Institute (Early Christian Literature and Classics departments) and the Institute of Syriac Manuscripts at the Lutheran School of Theology. A highlight of his studies includes close personal work with Dr. Arthur Vööbus, the renowned expert in Syriac church history and manuscripts.

"The spiritual understanding which I acquired in The Way Corps enables me to quickly and effectually sort through the myriad of Biblically related material in the academic world. The incredible depth of Corps training in the whole Word has given me the scope to see where my professors' viewpoints are based on the accuracy of the Word and where they are merely agnostic conjectures.

After years of disciplined practice and training, Mary Ann has done numerous recitals, accompanied various choral groups and vocal soloists, as well as composed and performed music for her solo album, "Heart." She received her bachelor of arts degree in music from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and has studied at Oxford University in England, traveling extensively around Europe. 
Elena S. Whiteside


Bill Standage
